- 2 (Following recitation of the Pledge of
- 3 Allegiance, the meeting was called to
- 4 order.)
- 5 MAYOR RUZICKA: I call the meeting to
- 6 order. Trustees Naudus is absent and Trustee
- 7 D'Esposito is representing the Village tonight
- 8 getting an award from the fire district. Report
- 9 of the Commissioners. Planning and Zoning. Do
- 10 you have Irene's?
- 11 TRUSTEE HASTAVA: Yes, I have it.
- 12 October 2013 building permits were issued to the
- 13 following addresses for Superstorm Sandy related
- 14 repairs in September: 31 Lancaster. 416 and
- 15 560 Long Beach Road. 199 Nassau Lane. 2, 33,
- 16 and 75 Newport Road. 10 and 36 Parma Road and
- 17 66 Suffolk Road.
- 18 The following building permits were
- 19 issued in September: Single family dwelling, 11
- 20 Deal Road, maintain existing air conditioning
- 21 unit 26 Newport Road. Construct new one story
- 22 home, 54 Hastings Road. Construct new one
- 23 family home, 7 Hamilton Walk. Driveway
- 24 expansion and curb cut, 175 Nassau Lane.
- 25 Demolish dwelling, 7 Hamilton Walk. Install new

- 16 The Zoning Board of Appeals met on
- 17 September 4, 2013 to hear the following cases:
- 18 Fifteen point one three Higgins to construct a
- 19 new one family dwelling. Decision was granted.
- 20 Sixteen point one three, Madden, variances to
- 21 raise existing two story dwelling. Decision
- 22 pending. Seventeen point one three, Gubelli, to
- 23 construct new roof on existing front porch and
- 24 first and second story extensions. Decision
- 25 pending. Eighteen point one three, Padilla, to

- 3 Decision was granted.
- 4 The Zoning Board of Appeals met on
- 5 September 18, 2013 to hear the following case:
- 6 Nineteen point one three, Bradley. Elevate an
- 7 existing one family dwelling. Decision was
- 8 granted. Respectfully submitted, Irene Naudus.
- 9 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Public Works
- 10 report. The following was collected in
- 11 September: There was point five three tons of
- 12 agricultural waste, seven point four five tons
- 13 of mixed glass, two hundred twenty-six point
- 14 five five tons of municipal waste and eighteen
- 15 point fifty-five tons of storm waste. All
- 16 streetlights reported not working have been
- 17 repaired and all village owned property is being
- 18 maintained. That is my report.
- 19 TRUSTEE HASTAVA: Masone Beach is
- 20 closed for the winter. However, the new park
- 21 that was installed is open during the day for
- 22 the children as long as the weather keeps being
- 23 nice, and they seem to be enjoying it very much.
- MAYOR RUZICKA: Public safety. Do you
- 25 have his report?



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- TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Yes, I do. Nassau
- 3 County Police Department, two arrests, one
- 4 summons issued. There was nine accidents. They
- 5 responded to twenty-two aided cases and one
- 6 burglary. The fire department responded to
- 7 twenty-four general alarm, thirty-two rescue for
- 8 the ambulance, four aided for the ambulance, one
- 9 mutual aid out of town for fire rescue and one
- 10 extrication for Jaws of Life.
- 11 Code Enforcement gave out 69 no
- 12 parking permits. Thirty-four out of stalls.
- 13 Twenty-three backed into stalls. One fire
- 14 hydrant. Two commercial parking. Fifty-one
- 15 restricted parking. One parked at sidewalk.
- 16 Thirty and seven alternate parking. Seven
- 17 parked in a bus stop. Three left to curb. One
- 18 handicapped permit. Twenty expired inspections.
- 19 Nine expired registrations. Four no front
- 20 plate. One having the garbage out not during
- 21 hours. Two hundred eighty-one tickets. That is
- 22 my report.
- MAYOR RUZICKA: My report today, the
- 24 Village had a walk-through with an architect
- 25 that we hired for the design of new village



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- 2 hall. He did do some preliminary drawings and
- 3 will get back to the Village on some of his
- 4 concepts. We are looking to demolish the old
- 5 building sometime this fall, so within the next
- 6 month, hopefully we will have that done.
- As you may have read in Newsday, New
- 8 York Rising is sending out award letters to
- 9 those that filed. These awards should help
- 10 those in need to making property more resilient
- 11 to future storms. We have been waiting a long
- 12 time for money to come in from New York Rising,
- 13 and it seems to be starting, so that is a good
- 14 thing.
- Construction, we had a construction of
- 16 a playground that took place September 26th,
- 17 27th and 28th at Masone Beach. We had a great
- 18 turnout and the event was a huge success. On
- 19 Saturday, the 28th, the family joined us in a
- 20 ribbon cutting ceremony. It was a memorable and
- 21 heartfelt day. The Village would like to thank
- 22 all those who were involved in the project. The
- 23 little girl, unfortunately her life was taken in
- 24 Sandy Hook up in Newtown, Connecticut. This
- 25 playground was donated to us by the Sandy Ground



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- 2 Project, who is doing twenty-six parks
- 3 throughout the tri-state area.
- We were selected, and we are honored
- 5 to have this. It is a beautiful thing. It took
- 6 twelve hours of hard work by everybody that
- 7 volunteered. A whole bunch of people
- 8 volunteered. I can't praise them all enough.
- 9 The Down family, who does parks, gave their
- 10 time. Halen Construction Corporation came down
- 11 with cement trucks and gave their manpower free,
- 12 and also the Sandy Ground Project.
- 13 Again, it was really a wonderful day
- 14 and hopefully it will be well used by our
- 15 village. The Village, also, unfortunately that
- 16 evening after the ceremony, a bell was taken
- 17 from that park. Don't know how it was taken,
- 18 why it was taken. We can only surmise, but I
- 19 won't go in to that. Unfortunately, there are
- 20 some people are low class and decided to do that
- 21 and not get back to us. If there was a problem
- 22 with the bell, they could have contacted the
- 23 Village Board and they could have done
- 24 something.
- It did put a black eye on the Village.



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- 2 We did reach out and apologize to the family.
- 3. Hopefully, we are going to replace the bell.
- 4 We will address that if there is a problem.
- 5 The Village had been in contact with
- 6 inspector of Nassau County Police Department 4th
- 7 Precinct to advise residents to lock their cars.
- 8 There have been reports of break-ins in unlocked
- 9 cars and items stolen from vehicles.
- The Village applied for a forty-five
- 11 million dollar Hazardous Mitigation Grant
- 12 Program. Since that time we have been advised
- 13 that we have made it to the second phase of the
- 14 application process. Therefore, we are
- 15 encouraging all residential and property owners
- 16 in the Village to fill out the property
- 17 information worksheet that was sent out, which
- 18 is available on the Village website and Facebook
- 19 page and village hall.
- We are looking for people to share
- 21 with us their total loss from Hurricane Sandy,
- 22 including damages to their homes, vehicles,
- 23 contents, etcetera. This way they can prove to
- 24 the Hazardous Mitigation Grant Program if that
- 25 if they spent the money on the Village now and



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- 2 allow us to mitigate our problems and improve
- 3 our infrastructure, in the long run will be cost
- 4 effective and beneficial. We need our help.
- 5 Although the deadline for the submission for the
- 6 work sheet was originally set for Friday,
- 7 October 18th, we will continue to accept
- 8 worksheets through next week. And these
- 9 documents can be hand delivered at village hall
- 10 or faxed.
- It's a simple nineteen question thing.
- 12 It's not that involved. Please help us. If we
- 13 can get this forty-five million dollars for this
- 14 community, it would be so really -- take care of
- 15 a lot of problems here, drainage problems,
- 16 bulkheads, it really goes a long way.
- The next two meetings of the CRP will
- 18 be held at the Village hall in the Board meeting
- 19 room on Tuesday, October 22nd and Wednesday,
- 20 October, 30th seven to nine. These are
- 21 workshops. Workshop meeting is the public
- 22 doesn't participate, but there will be some time
- 23 at the end for limited involvement with the
- 24 public.
- We did have a meeting, over in St.

- 2 Anthony's. It was an open public meeting. I'm
- 3 disappointed that our community didn't come out.
- 4 We only had four or five people from the village
- 5 that participated. The problem could be that it
- 6 was out of the way, over in Oceanside. Maybe a
- 7 lot of people didn't know the area. Hopefully,
- 8 the next public hearings, we will have more
- 9 people come out and we are looking for feedback
- 10 from the community. So we need ideas. Keep
- 11 that in mind. Come down to the meetings. You
- 12 can listen to the committee.
- 13 That's it. That is my report. I
- 14 thank you. Resolutions.
- MS. CONROY: Resolved that the
- 16 abstract of audited vouchers for to the month of
- 17 October, 2013 been approved for payment.
- 18 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: Motion.
- 19 TRUSTEE HASTAVA: Second.
- 20 (Whereupon, the resolution was voted
- 21 upon and passed.)
- MS. CONROY: Resolved that the Board
- 23 of Trustees has reviewed the financial
- 24 statements for the month of September 2013.
- 25 TRUSTEE HASTAVA: Motion.

CONROY: Resolved that based upon 6 the findings during an inspection conducted by 7 the Nassau County Department of Public Works field technicians, the Village clerk was 8 9 authorized to contract the services of Welsbach 10 Electrical Corporation of Long Island to furnish 11 and install a new traffic signal, 336 S cabinet 12 and axillary support equipment in front of the 13 firehouse on Long Beach Road for a cost not to 14 exceed seventeen thousand dollars. 15 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: 16 TRUSTEE HASTAVA: Second. 17 (Whereupon, the resolution was voted 18 upon and passed.) 19 MS. CONROY: Resolved that the mayor 20 is authorized to contract the services of MTS 21 Power Systems to provide on-site planned 22 maintenance for the emergency generator located at the firehouse on Long Beach Road for a cost 23 24 not to exceed nine hundred dollars per year.

- MS. CONROY: Whereas, the next
- 11 election for village office will be held on
- 12 March 18, 2014, and whereas, the Board of
- 13 Trustees must designate by resolution and
- 14 published the offices which are to be filed in
- 15 such election and their terms thereof.
- 16 Therefore be it resolved that the
- 17 Board of Trustees designate the following
- 18 offices as vacant at the end of the official
- 19 year to be held at the Village election to be
- 20 held on March 18, 2014 for the following terms:
- 21 Mayor, one position, four years. Trustees, two
- 22 positions, four years. Justice, one position
- 23 four years.
- Be it further resolved for the purpose
- 25 of the forthcoming village election, the Village



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- 2 shall be divided into election district as
- 3 follows: District 1, that portion of the
- 4 Village located south of the center line of
- 5 Sagamore Road. District Number 2, that portion
- 6 of the Village located north of the center line
- 7 of Sagamore Road. This resolution will be
- 8 published in the official newspaper.
- 9 MAYOR RUZICKA: Motion, please.

- MS. CONROY: Whereas, the Board of
- 15 Trustees of the Village of Island Park, that is
- 16 the Board, which is the sponsor of the Village
- 17 of Island Park Service Award Program, that is
- 18 the Program, which became effective January 1,
- 19 1994, and whereas New York State General
- 20 Municipal Law Article 11-A, Section 217(h)
- 21 states in summary that a Service Award Program
- 22 may designate that benefits can be paid in
- 23 different actuarial equivalent forms, and
- 24 whereas, currently, monthly payments made from
- 25 the program to entitled participants are

- 2 guaranteed to be made for one hundred twenty
- 3 months from the date that such benefits become
- 4 payable, and whereas, in the event a participant
- 5 dies before receiving all one hundred twenty
- 6 guaranteed monthly payments, the designated
- 7 beneficiary will continue to receive the
- 8 remaining portion of such guaranteed monthly
- 9 payments.
- And whereas, if payment is paid to the
- 11 estate upon the particapant's death, it is an
- 12 administrative burden to the estate to collect
- 13 monthly payments, and thereby necessitate
- 14 keeping the estate account open for a long
- 15 period of time, and whereas, Penflex,
- 16 Incorporated, the firm retained by the Board to
- 17 provide actuarial and administrative services
- 18 for the program, is recommending that the Board
- 19 allow beneficiaries of deceased monthly Payees
- 20 to elect to receive a one time actuarial
- 21 equivalent lump sum instead of receiving the
- 22 monthly payments, and whereas, Penflex,
- 23 Incorporated states that allowing such an option
- 24 will not increase the cost of the Program and
- 25 will actually make the Program easier to

- 3 costs of the program if this option is selected
- 4 by the beneficiary.
- Now, therefore be it resolved that the
- 6 administrative procedures of the Village of
- 7 Island Park Service Award Program shall be
- 8 changed immediately to allow any beneficiary of
- 9 a deceased monthly payee to elect to be paid a
- 10 one time actuarial equivalent lump sum instead
- 11 of being paid the remaining portion of the one
- 12 hundred twenty guaranteed monthly payments, and
- 13 such lump sum may be calculated using the same
- 14 interest rate used to calculate the annual
- 15 required contribution during the year of death.
- 16 TRUSTEE HASTAVA: Motion.
- 17 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: I'll second.
- 18 (Whereupon, the resolution was voted
- 19 upon and passed.)
- MS. CONROY: Whereas, the Village
- 21 sustained damage from Hurricane Sandy and
- 22 asbestos sampling needs to be performed prior to
- 23 demolition. Whereas, Davis Building
- 24 Construction Corporation has submitted a
- 25 proposal for four thousand eight hundred twenty

- 3 LLC has submitted a proposal for four thousand

- 8 mayor is authorized to sign a contract with Jet
- 9 Environmental Consulting, LLC for asbestos
- 10 inspection and sampling for a cost of four
- 11 thousand dollars.
- 12 TRUSTEE ANNARELLA: I'll make the
- 13 motion.
- 14 TRUSTEE HASTAVA: Second.
- 15 (Whereupon, the resolution was voted
- 16 upon and passed.)
- MS. CONROY: Whereas, the Village hall
- 18 sustained damage from Hurricane Sandy and the
- 19 content of bottom four feet of Sheetrock has to
- 20 be removed and properly disposed. Whereas,
- 21 Davis Building Construction Corporation has
- 22 submitted a proposal for eighteen thousand six
- 23 hundred forty dollars. Whereas, 3J Site
- 24 Development Corp. has submitted a proposal for
- 25 twenty-one thousand five hundred dollars.



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2	Whereas, Strong Island Contracting Corp. has
3	submitted a proposal for nineteen thousand seven
